One drug per sheet. Every receipt, dispense, waste and return, with a running balance. A month of sample entries, and the arithmetic behind the balance.

How the balance is checked

Expected on hand = balance brought forward + received + returned - dispensed - wasted or destroyed.

On this sheet: $48 + 100 + 6 - 114 - 6 = 34$. The physical count on 2026-08-31 was 34, so there is no variance.

A variance is the difference between that expected figure and what is actually on the shelf. Investigate it before concluding anything: recount, then check the records behind each total for an unlogged destruction, a dispense recorded under a different DIN, or a transaction dated just outside the window.

Retention: in Ontario, pharmacy patient and dispensing records must be kept at least 10 years (O. Reg. 264/16 s. 21). Federally, at least 2 years, under a separate regulation for each class of drug: narcotics (Narcotic Control Regulations s. 40.1), Part G controlled drugs (Food and Drug Regulations s. G.03.010), and targeted substances (Benzodiazepines and Other Targeted Substances Regulations s. 75).

Cadence: the Ontario College of Pharmacists expects narcotics and controlled substances to be reconciled at least every six months. Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island are stricter, reconciling narcotics and controlled drugs monthly. Alberta, British Columbia, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, and Newfoundland & Labrador generally require reconciliation every three months.
